Travelling to Latvia & Rīga

Latvia is a Member State of the European Union and adheres to the Schengen Agreement. Rīga can be easily reached by various means of transport – plane, ferry, train or bus. Latvia has land borders with Estonia, Lithuania, Belarus and Russia. Travelling to Rīga by aircraft is easy and fast – there are direct flights to Rīga from airports in European capitals and business hubs, as well as from Russia, Israel, Turkey, etc.

Alternatively, you can take a bus – there are buses travelling to Latvia from European countries, Russia, and Belarus. Travellers from Russia and Belarus can also reach Latvia by train. Additionally, there is good ferry traffic across the Baltic sea.

Travelling & Getting There

1. Airport to Riga Center

Jelgava is about 50 km from Rīga International Airport. At arrival, first, you have to choose direct transfer from Airport to the Rīga International Bus Station or Rīga Central Train Station by domestic bus or taxi:



Take a taxi. Price varies between 15–20 EUR.



Take Public Bus No. 22, which has direct services from the airport to the city centre. Frequency 10-30 minutes, it will take you around 30 minutes to get to the city centre. A single ride ticket from the bus driver costs EUR 2.



Take the Airport Express minibus. The price for a ride is 5 EUR. Payments are accepted in cash or by a payment card.

2. Riga to Jelgava

Second, you have to choose transport to Jelgava:



From Rīga International Bus Station. From there you can choose a direct bus to Jelgava. It will take you about 55 min for EUR 2,30 to reach Jelgava.



From Rīga Central Train Station. In the Rīga Central Train Station you can choose direct electric train to Jelgava. It will take you 50 min for EUR 1,90 to reach Jelgava. If your luggage exceeds the permitted dimensions or weight (40 cm x 60 cm x 20 cm or 20 kg) you need to purchase a luggage ticket. That will cost you additional EUR 0.57.

First steps to take after arrival

You should get settled into the dormitory and relax. Let your relatives and friends know that you have safe and sound reached your destination. Once you have done this, you should go to your Coordinator.

If you are an Exchange student you can find your Coordinator from Monday to Friday in Jelgava palace, Liela Street 2, Room 195. If you are a Full-time student you can find your Coordinator from Monday to Friday in Jelgava palace, Liela Street 2, Room 192.

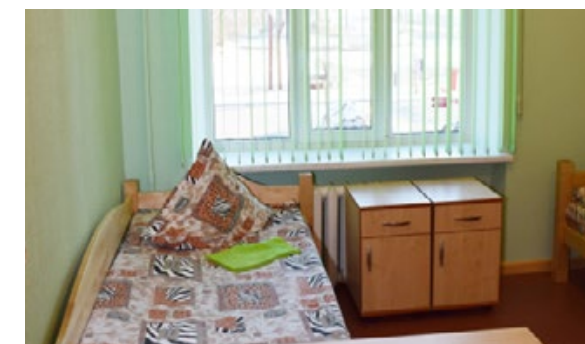
Accommodation

Student dormitory

International students have various options where to live during the study period at University. LLU offers a comfortable accommodation possibilities in the city centre in dormitory No. 8. All University facilities are easy reachable on foot and will take only up to 15 minutes. The distance between Jelgava palace (main building) and dormitory No. 8 is about 1.1 km or 10-15 minutes on foot. The rooms are in a very good condition and the furniture is new. It is intended for two persons to share the room, but depending on your needs, living alone is also possible (double price will be adjusted).

At the dormitory, you will have:

- a bathroom and fridge in each room,
- kitchen in combination with lounge on each floor.



There is no need to take your own bed sheets or towels with you as dormitory No. 8 ensures that you'll have bed sheets and towels in your room. Also, you do not need to take any pots or pans or cutlery with you as the dormitory's kitchen is stocked with these items. The dormitory offers an electric iron as well. You just have to ask it to the administration staff.

Utilities

If you are thinking about renting an apartment, please keep in mind that the utility costs (water, electricity, central heating in winter, etc.) are mostly calculated

separately and are not included in the price of rent. Utility costs can be quite high, starting from EUR 70 in summer up to EUR 200 in winter.



If you are, or will be registered as an exchange or full-time student at LLU (have submitted all required application documents), we will arrange the accommodation for you. Before your arrival please check if a place at the dormitory is reserved for you by writing to email: admission@llu.lv

Accommodation

Electricity

The electrical voltage in Latvia is 220, and electrical plugs used here are the same as in the rest of continental Europe, meaning, a two-wire plug with two round horizontal prongs (sockets should accept

4.0 – 4.8 mm round contacts on 19 mm centres). Students bringing electrical appliances from countries with different plugs or electrical voltage should buy an adapter.

Planning your budget

The cost of living highly depends on your lifestyle preferences. LLU international students recommend a minimum of EUR 400 per month (including accommodation). Comparative table gives an overview of the cost of living in Jelgava.

Residence permit and Registration card

Before arrival to Latvia all non-EU/EEA students have to apply for visa/temporary residence permit that provides a foreigner the rights to reside in the Republic of Latvia for a definite period of time. The residence permit (for non-EU/EEA citizens) and the registration card (for EU/EEA citizens) is necessary if you are willing to reside in the Republic of Latvia for a period of time exceeding 90 days within half a year counting from the first day of entrance. This rule applies to all LLU international students as from EU/EEA, as non-EU/EEA countries. Documents are prepared with the help of LLU International Cooperation Centre.

The residence permit obtaining procedure can last over 1 month. Be sure to duly arrange all herewith linked questions. Once the residence permit is acquired, it will be valid for one year. Every year residence permit must be prolonged. You need to take into consideration, that also the prolongation procedure can take over 1 month. The registration card for citizens of EU/EEA countries is given for whole study period.

Studies

Higher education traditions in Jelgava have deep roots, reaching back to the time of the “Academia Petrina” in 1775. These traditions are indirectly inherited by LLU. Nowadays LLU offers wide opportunities for studies in 14 unique fields where half of them can be studied only at LLU – agriculture, food technology, veterinary medicine, food hygiene and landscape architecture. University is offering also widespread study areas such as IT, economics and

social sciences, engineering, pedagogy. The study process consists of two major parts – attending classes at the University and learning independently. The study process at the University is organized in the form of lectures, seminars and tutorials. Typically, you will be expected to attend the University on a daily basis, though the number of lectures depends on each faculty, and also your specialisation.

Credit points

Each course is worth a certain amount of credit points (CP). The amount of CP's is determined by the number of classes per week or/and the amount of work necessary to complete the class. The average amount of CP for full time study year is 40CP (20CP per semester). Latvian

CP's differ from European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS) yet it is compatible with it, which means that credits earned at LLU can be transferred to other higher education institutions in the EU/EEA.

Grading system

The final grade of each course may consist of several components (provided by the teacher at the beginning of the course): midterm exam, course paper, laboratory works, homeworks (assessment during semester) and final exam.

ranging from (10) “with distinction” to (4) “almost satisfactory” and the Pass assessment are considered to be positive. The final assessment may be an exam (graded with a mark from 10-0) or a test (graded with Pass or Fail).

Latvia's higher education uses a ten-point grading system, the assessments

Academic debts

It may happen that due to some reasons you fail to complete a study course. There can be various reasons for that – unsuccessful results of the exam, or you have failed to fulfil the requirements of the course due to illness etc. It is possible to take the exam again and complete the course. First, you have to agree with the teacher about the procedure

for completing the course (time, place). Second, full time students have to turn to Dean's office at their Faculty (exchange students to International Cooperation Centre) to receive the individual evaluation sheet of the study course. The staff will inform you if the repeated examination is subject to a fee.

Exchange studies

Students have opportunity to take a part in international exchange programme for studies or internship. Within Erasmus+ programme students can go for exchange for one or two semesters to one of 150 partner universities of LLU.

Participating in any exchange program student will receive full credits for all academic work successfully carried out at LLU and will be able to transfer these academic credits on the bases of a formal agreement between LLU and home university.

When the student has successfully completed the study programme previously agreed between the home and the host institutions and returns to the home institution, credit transfer will take place, and the student will continue the study course at the home institution without any loss of theme or credit. Library

The Fundamental library of the LLU is an accredited library of state significance. It is not only the biggest library of agricultural literature in Latvia, but also the deposit library of the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation and the national centre of the information systems AGRIS and CARIS. All the publications in the stock of the library are available to public.

- Copying self-service which is available by using the University ID where you can deposit some money for copying (you can deposit money onto your ID in the copy room which is on the first floor of library).

Open hours of the library are regularly 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. during working days.

The library is closed on Saturday and Sunday.

E-learning environment

teachers will inform you if they use the e-learning support in their courses and they will also add you to the respective course in the e-learning system.

Welcome week

Every semester a Welcome Week is held for all international and Erasmus+ students before the beginning of studies. Welcome Week is designed to help international students settle and get acquainted with life in Jelgava and studies at LLU. Welcome Week consists of sessions concerning academic and practical issues, library,

Student Union, life in Jelgava, as well as social events and trips. Usually Welcome Week is held during the first week of semester or the week before the semester while regular courses and studies will start from the first week of the semester. The programme for the Welcome Week will be emailed to all international students before their arrival.

Sports

University provides wide opportunities to participate in sports. The University has two sport halls, a swimming pool, space for aerobics, martial arts, fitness equipment, as well as a sports ground and horse-riding sports centre. Sport classes

are available: basketball, volley-ball, ping-pong, track-and-field athletics, Greek-Roman wrestling, judo, aerobics, floorball, orienteering, football, weight lifting, badminton and horse-riding.



Living in Jelgava

Jelgava is one of the oldest Latvian cities, the city rights were granted in 1573. It is situated on the banks of the river Lielupe, only 40 km from Rīga. With 66 000 inhabitants and total area of 60 km² Jelgava ranks fourth among the largest cities of Latvia. Jelgava is called also as a Students' City and is considered as one of the greenest cities in Latvia. It has architectural, cultural, historical and natural monuments as well as contemporary buildings and attractive recreation facilities.

There are a number of activities offered in the city that you can explore – cafes, clubs, sports activities, theatre etc.

Shopping

You will find a wide variety of places to do your shopping in Jelgava:

The City Arcade (Pilsētas Pasāža)



Trading centre is designed as a pedestrian street with lanterns, which makes shopping process feel like a walk in a leisurely atmosphere. Geographically convenient location of the building provides easy access to its visitors.

VIVO shopping mall



One of the most popular shopping centres in Jelgava and its surrounding.

Trade centre „KANCLERA NAMS”



There is offered a wide range of stationery, household goods, books, school appliances and bags, clothes, sports goods, bicycles, furniture, toys, curtains and household appliances.

Shopping mall “Valdeka”



Arriving Jelgava from Rīga side, you are welcome to shop in the “Valdeka”.

For food products, many people prefer organic food from Latvian farmers at market. Also, there are supermarket chains where you can buy food:

Irrespective of the number of Xs added to the end of the name, the quality of products varies. Pay extra attention to expiry dates on food products!



Cafes & Restaurants

Jelgava offers a variety of places to eat out, from American fast food, pizzerias to expensive restaurants with contemporary Latvian and international cuisines. Lunch at cafeteria will cost from 2.50-3.50 EUR, lunch at restaurant from 7-10 EUR.

Smoking

In public, you are only allowed to smoke in places specially designated for this purpose. It is forbidden to smoke in parks and at bus stops, as well as closer than 10 metres from the entrance of any governmental and public building. Smoking on University premises is prohibited!

Drinking

The sale of alcoholic beverages in stores is prohibited from 22.00 until 8.00. However, if you are over 18 years of age, you can buy alcohol in bars, cafés and clubs without any limitation on time. You may be asked to present a document of identification to verify your age. Also, it's not allowed to be in public places (street, park) with an open bottle of strong drinks (incl. beer).

Leisure & Entertainment

Nightlife in Jelgava is always vibrant. There are several bars and night clubs.



Music club "Tonuss"

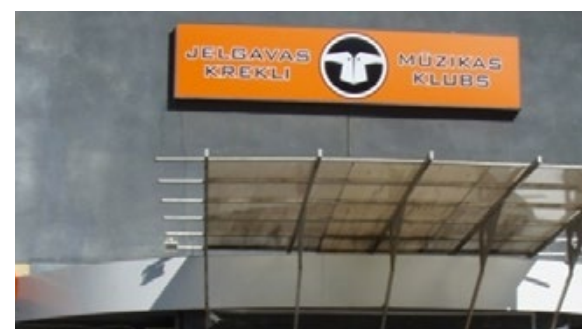
The modern nightclub is one of the most popular attractions in Jelgava. "Tonuss" is actively cooperating with the best Latvian and foreign DJ and music groups, enjoying the club's visitors with large-scale concerts and thematic events.



Pub "Melno cepurišu balerija" (Black Hat Ballery)

A cozy bar-gallery intended for people who respect culture and arts. This is the only place in Jelgava where you can enjoy alternative music.

Performing groups range from hip hop, reggae and hardcore, metal and experimental music. It is highly recommended place from our international students.



Music club "Jelgavas krekli"

A venue for joyful student events. Group performances are carried out on Wednesdays and Fridays, on Saturdays – themed events and parties. If you want to experience a genuine student atmosphere and a party atmosphere typical only for Jelgava, Wednesdays and Saturdays are the "real" days. On Fridays, you can enjoy 100% Latvian music.



Entertainment and leisure

On national holidays the University, as well as other institutions in Latvia are closed.

Weather & Clothing

Latvia has a moderate maritime climate, with mild summers, with an average temperature of 20°C. Typical summer months are June to August, although May and September can be rather pleasant, mild and warm too. Winters are considered moderate as well, with snowfall (often sleet) and temperatures ranging from -5 to -20°C.

Occasionally, in February, the temperatures may drop to -25°C. Each year can be different and it is difficult to predict, but you have be ready for a winter experience with snow and very cold temperatures, so clothing and footwear such as boots, gloves, scarfs, hats, winter jackets is a must! These things can be bought here too.

Religion

Western, Central and Northern parts of Latvia are mostly Lutheran, whereas the Eastern part of Latvia is mostly Roman Catholic. Orthodox community can be found

in all major cities in Latvia and the Eastern part of the country.

Personal security

Jelgava and Latvia, in general, are fairly safe. Violent street crimes are rare and most security problems are associated with petty theft, such as pick-pocketing. Take care of your personal belongings and avoid unlit streets late at night.

In an emergency situation call the toll-free number 112, as this is the general contact number for the emergency service. This number can be used to contact police, fire brigade, ambulance, and gas emergency services. Operators can take calls in Latvian, Russian, English and German.

Postal services

Latvijas Pasts provides postal services, including express delivery services, Western Union services, bill payments etc. The central post office in Jelgava is located at Katoļu Street 2B (near shopping centre Pilsētas

pasāža). To receive packages and shipments, make sure you know your postal code (pasta indekss). If you live in Jelgava it will always start with LV-30xx, so find out what the last two digits are for your address!

Currency exchange

Since 2014, the official currency in Latvia is Euro (EUR). If necessary, you can exchange your currency in banks or private currency exchange offices. Check

and compare rates before undertaking any transactions. You can check the official rates at the Bank of Latvia: www.bank.lv/en

Working in Latvia

In order to work in Latvia, no work permit is required for the citizens of EU/EEA countries and Switzerland or their family members who have free access to the labour market in Latvia.

Nationals of other countries has the right to request a work permit if the working hours specified in the employment contract do not exceed 20 hours per week.

ATMS & Payments

There is no shortage of ATMs (bankomāts) – most banks have them in shopping malls, in branch offices of banks, on street corners, near office buildings and gas stations. ATMs are available 24/7. Credit cards and debit cards are widely accepted for making payments. In addition, Internet banking is widely used for paying bills, recharging phones, topping

up e-tickets, shopping on the Internet and using many other services.

Bank services

To open a bank account, take your passport or ID card and go to any branch office of a bank of your choice. File an application and choose the type of services you would like to receive from the bank. The usual opening hours for the banks is 9.00 - 17.00 on working days. Living in Latvia

Food

Latvian national cuisine has been formed under the influence of cuisines from the neighbouring countries and the meals served today are particularly rich in other nationality dishes. Most restaurants and canteens in Jelgava offer a variety of nice meals for reasonable prices.

If you prefer to cook for yourself, the ingredients for various meals can be found in the local supermarkets.

Kartupeļi (potatoes) are served with nearly all Latvian food and they're usually either boiled, fried, boiled and then fried or mashed. Sometimes, traditional restaurants or canteens will also offer **griķi** (boiled buckwheat) instead of potatoes.

Meat is present in most main courses. Nevertheless, **fish** is also commonly consumed due to Latvia's wealth of water reservoirs: smoked and raw fish are quite common. Herring (salted or marinated) is particularly popular and it is served cold.

Latvia is rich in **milk products**. **Biezpiens** (cottage cheese), **skābais krējums** (sour cream), **rūgušpiens** (soured milk) and a lot of various cheeses like **Jāņu siers** (caraway cheese) is traditionally served on the Latvian Midsummer festival **Jāņi**.

Kāposti (cabbage) also plays a major role in most Latvian meals. Sometimes it's

The typical Latvian meal is a vegetable soup, potatoes with meat, vegetable stews and fish dishes, different kind of salads, various kinds of bread, nice and interesting desserts and pastry. The traditional and very popular drink is beer. It is common in Latvia to have a warm meal for lunch, as well as for dinner.

served cold as a salad or hot as a side dish like **skābie kāposti** (sauerkraut). Latvians eat also **škovētie** or **štovētie kāposti**, which is like sauerkraut but sweeter and darker in colour as it's stewed longer with sugar.

Pelēkie zirņi (grey peas) is another side dish worth trying. Big, grey round peas are boiled and then fried with bacon and usually served with **kefīrs** (kefir) or **skābais krējums** (sour cream).

All kinds of **pickled items** are also on offer at most Latvian establishments including beets, mushrooms and, of course, cucumbers. If you see the word **marinēts** on a menu it means that something has been marinated in vinegar.

Living in Latvia

Latvians refer to all salads as **salāti** including the classic local staple *rosols*, which is a combination of pickled vegetables, potatoes and meat held together with loads of mayonnaise, mustard and horseradish. Other salads are drenched in sour cream.

Soups are usually hearty like *frikadeļu zupa* (meatball soup), *zirņu zupa* (pea soup) and the Russian favourite *soļanka* (tangy tomato soup with potatoes, sausage, kidney and pickles).

Latvian seasonings seldom stray beyond *dilles* (dill), *ķimenes* (caraway seeds), salt and pepper.

Pīrāgi – buns filled with bacon and onion



Aukstā zupa – cold beetroot soup



Although Latvians love ice cream, cake and chocolate, **traditional desserts** include *maizes zupa* (rye bread pudding) and *ķīselis* (starchy fruit pudding served with milk). Bakeries are also full of sweet and savoury pastries called *pīrāgi* with any number of fillings from bacon and onions to mushrooms and even cherries. Finally, a *sklandrausis* is a delicious sweet pie consisting of mashed carrots and potatoes baked in a rye flour crust. In 2013, the *sklandrausis* became the first Latvian food to be listed in the EU's Traditional Specialties Guaranteed registry meaning that only a pie created according to a specific recipe can be called a *sklandrausis*.

Rasols – the ultimate universal soldier amongst salads, rasol is a great way to empty the fridge as it will take almost anything you throw at it.

Soļanka – soup with ingredients like beef, ham, sausage, potato and cabbage, salted mushrooms, tomatoes, onions, olives and parsley.



Pelmeņi – meat dumplings made of some minced seasoned meat which is put in small pockets of dough and boiled. The ultimate student food.

Kvass

drink that is made out of rye bread. Popular choice of drink on hot summer days.



Rūgušpiens

clabber is very refreshing and is enjoyed throughout rural Latvia. Rich in probiotics like its eastern cousin kefir, the drink is highly beneficial for your immune and digestive system.

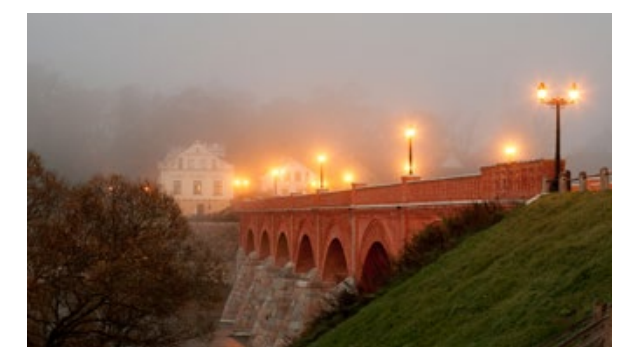
Liepāja

It is advisable to see Gūtmanis cave near Sigulda and Turaida castle.

The single emergency

Hotline number 112 will provide information on what to do in certain situations, or connect you to the appropriate service – emergency medical,

fire department, natural gas emergency, or the police. The number 112 is toll-free and reachable from land lines as well as from mobile phones.

Information Hotline

The Hotline 1188 provides information about business addresses, hours, service providers, state institutions, public transport timetables, concerts and events, as well as all vital tourist information – accommodations, museums, attractions, restaurants and cafes, and medical centres. The Hotline is reachable 24 hours per day. Information is provided in Latvian, Russian, and English.

There are several medical institutions in Jelgava where you can receive medical services:

To receive treatment, you need to have an appointment with doctor. Call to the medical institution and ask for available time – ask International Cooperation Centre for help if needed. In case of emergency dial 112 or 03 (ambulance).

Many physicians do not speak English, so before visiting a doctor ask the International Cooperation Centre for a recommendation.

Medical help

If you are an EU citizen who requires medical attention while in Latvia, use the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). It confirms your right to receive the same services as those offered to Latvian nationals. If you are not an EU citizen and do not have an EHIC card but require emergency medical

assistance, you will have to pay full cost of the services.

For non-serious illness and to buy medicines you can ask a pharmacist in the pharmacies in the city.
